Robert Skutch		<p>Beginning with a traditional nuclear family and ending with blank spaces in which the child reader is instructed to "draw a picture of your family," this slight book catalogues multicultural contemporary family units, including those with single parents, lesbian and gay parents, mixed-race couples, grandparents and divorced parents. Because "animals have families, too," the text describes elephant, lion, chimpanzee and dog families as well as human families.</p>
Primary	And Tango Makes Three	Justin Richardson		<p>Based on the true story of Roy and Silo, two male Chinstrap penguins in New York's Central Park Zoo. The book follows the six years of their life when they formed a couple and were given an egg to raise.</p>
Junior	Wangari's Trees of Peace	Jeanette Winter		<p>This true story of Wangari Maathai, environmentalist and winner of the Nobel Peace Prize, is a shining example of how one woman's passion, vision, and determination inspired great change.</p>

Junior	The Librarian of Basra	Jeanette Winter		Alia Muhammad Baker, the librarian in Basra, Iraq, works hard to save the precious books when war comes.
Junior	10 000 Dresses	Marcus Ewert		A picture book about a gender variant child. It portrays a family resistant to a child's gender variant interests and feelings. The child finds outside support through an accepting friendship.

Sadako's determination to fold one thousand paper cranes and her courageous struggle with her illness inspired her classmates. After her death, they started a national campaign to build the Children's Peace Statue to remember Sadako and the many other children who were victims of the Hiroshima bombing.</p>

Eddie Lee is a child with Down's syndrome and it is difficult for a young neighbour to "be good to Eddie Lee" until Eddie Lee makes a real discovery in the woods.</p>
Intermediate	Waiting for the Owl's Call	Gloria Whelan		<p>For generations the women of Zulviya's family have earned their living by weaving rugs by hand. During one work day, Zulviya will tie thousand of knots. As she sits at her work, Zulviya weaves not one but two patterns. The pattern on the loom will become a fine rug. She weaves a second pattern in her mind.</p>
Intermediate	Every Human Has Rights	NG and Mary Robinson		<p>With stunning photographs from all over the world and poetry contributed by students from the ePals community, this book uses plain language and clear examples to lay out the 30 principles in the United Nations' <i>Universal Declaration of Human Rights</i>.</p>

Intermediate	Dad, Jackie, and Me	Myron Uhlberg		<p>This story is based on Uhlberg's experiences growing up as a hearing child of deaf parents. The tale is set in Brooklyn in 1947, where a young Dodger fan eagerly anticipates the much-heralded addition of Jackie Robinson to his team's lineup. Surprisingly, the narrator's deaf father is interested too; he has recognized his own struggle for respect and acceptance mirrored in Robinson's triumph. Robinson is little more than an iconic figure, but others will appreciate the story's insightful treatment of deafness as viewed through the eyes of a child.</p>
