Social Justice Drama Workshop for Students

International Anti-Homophobia Day

(Workshop Dates: March 23, 25, 27, 28, 30, 2010)

Attention: Educators, Parents and Guardians

This project aims to show new perspectives on homophobia. Homophobia is a negative attitude or feeling, an aversion towards gays and lesbians or towards homosexuality in general. It is also the rejection of people considered gay or lesbian and of all things associated with, for example gender non-conformity.

The goal of this project is to allow students a forum to create a show that they feel is a reflection of their own thoughts, feelings and attitudes on LGBT issues within our schools and community. After the workshop is completed students will be invited back to audition and be part of the production team during April and May. Taking part in these workshops and production allows students to become the engineers in the development and outcome of the play that will be shown on May 17, 2010, International Anti- Homophobia day (www.homophobiaday.com). This day promotes the importance of reaching the community and the world about Homophobia. Adopting this day allows Windsor to become more aware of the prejudice and hatred that still plagues the whole community. Windsor Pride has felt the importance of this day and has decided to develop educational programming for this day.

On March 23-30 we will be holding workshops to create a youth social justice play concerning the theme of Anti-Homophobia. This adult supervised program is offered by Windsor Pride Community at no cost to participants. Due to the sensitive nature of this topic we have taken great care to develop the workshop process. The process will respect the confidentially of the participants. Students in the department of social work at the University of Windsor will assist students in their participation.

We ask you to encourage youth to participate. With your support we can work together through the theatre medium to bridge the gap, and bring change into our community.

Social Justice Drama Workshop for Students (Workshop Dates: November 8, 10, 12, 15, 17, 19, 2011)

Attention: Educators, Parents and Guardians

This project aims to show new perspectives on Hate Crimes and/or Hate motivated speech or acts. Hate Crimes occurs when the perpetrator of the crime intentionally selects the victim because of who the victim is. Violent crimes based on prejudice have a much stronger impact because the motivation behind the crime is to terrorize an individual affiliated with a specific group or community.

The goal of this project is to allow students and community the forum to create a show that they feel is a reflection of their own thoughts, feelings and attitudes on Hate motivated crime within our schools and community. After the workshop is completed students will be invited back to audition and be part of the production team during January and February of the New Year. Taking part in these workshops and production allows students to become the engineers of the development and outcome of the play that will be shown next year. The performances are aimed towards bringing awareness and sensitivity to the Windsor community. After the performances the audiences will take part in a community talk back where the audience engages in a dialogue and contributes to developing a way to create change in the Windsor community. Creating this forum allows Windsor to become more aware of the prejudice and hatred that still plagues the whole community.

On November 8-19 we will be holding workshops to create a youth social justice play concerning the theme of Hate Crimes. This program is offered by Windsor Pride Community and Windsor Police at no cost to participants. Due to the sensitive nature of this topic we have taken great care to develop the workshop process. The process will respect the confidentially of the participants. Social workers are provided by Family Service Windsor - Essex County. We ask you to encourage youth and community members to participate in this ground breaking production for Windsor. Chris Rabideau, B.A. Education. Ontario College of Teachers (Honours B.A. Drama in Education & Community, University of Windsor)

Chris brings experience as a director, performer, and educator to social justice workshops for youth. His most recent social justice works have included the award winning "Waking up Blue", a play about Homophobia in Windsor, with local LGBT (Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender) high school students. The show has also been documented in the film titled "Just Because I Am" released in 2011, shown throughout Ontario and Michigan this coming year. Chris has worked with the Newcomers Art Project also known as the NAP program which is part of Windsor Women Working with Immigrant Woman organization for the last 2 years where he has facilitated the arts with newcomer youth to Canada. He also has directed social justice productions with the NAP project including: "Flight 13" a play about newcomer bullying, "The Nature of Things", a play about the environment through a newcomer's lens. The latter production was entered into 2010's Fringe festival where it was well received. He has also created social justice productions on Black History month and Remembrance Day. Chris's passion for directing extends into musical theatre where he directed the critical acclaimed "Godspell" at the Chrysler Theatre in 2011. As a performer Chris has acted in several social justice production including "The New Canadian Kid", "See Saw" and "Whiley and the Hairy Man". Chris has also toured several high schools and Universities promoting safer schools through tolerance and acceptance for all. Chris looks forward to working with the University once again to educate future teachers on the importance of social justice in the classroom. Chris also enjoys working at Windsor Pride Community where he facilitates a group for local LGBT youth in the series "Coming Out for Teens" with the "OK2BME" project, partnered with Family Services Windsor. Just recently Chris received the Safer and Vital Communities grant partnered with Windsor Police and the Greater Essex County District School Board to work with youth in workshops to create and produce a play about Hate Crimes.
