


The book contains ideas and best practices that can be applied in classroom-management techniques, assessment tools, suggestions for connecting to the FNMI community in your town, and much more! 	<p>The Teacher's Toolkit is a collection of electronic resources from the Ministry of Education to help K-12 teachers bring First Nation, Métis, and Inuit (FNMI) perspectives into their classrooms. The Teacher's Toolkit was developed in 2009 to provide Ontario teachers with support they need to bring FNMI perspectives to life in the classroom. It does this through practical teaching strategies and lesson ideas that address one or more curriculum expectations and incorporate effective cross-curricular connections. The toolkit has a hard copy teacher's guide as well as a cd with teaching strategies and lesson ideas. Suggested activities and lists of research resources offer exciting and engaging opportunities to learn more about the history, customs and traditions of Inuit in Canada. This resource was developed by the Department of Indian and Northern Affairs Canada (now Aboriginal Affairs and Northern Development Canada) in 2003.
